Major Korean Church
Denominational Leaders Visit

In commemoration of the 140th anniversary of Korean missions, prominent leaders of the Korean Church visited our university from February 26 for three days, reaffirming their commitment to supporting and collaborating in the fields of educational and media missions. This significant occasion was graced by the presence of esteemed leaders, including Rev. Chul Lee (Former Presiding Bishop), Rev. Jung Seok Kim (Presiding Bishop), Rev. Jong Hyuk Kim (General Assembly Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Korea - Hapdong), and Rev. Young Gul Kim (General Assembly Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Korea Tonghap). Accompanying them were Chairman Kyeong Chul Kam (CTS) and Vice President Do Young Kim. The delegation was welcomed at Julius International Airport in Dar es Salaam by Prof. Sung Soo Kim, Vice Chancellor and Prof. Thierry, Deputy Vice Chancellor, as well as representatives of administrative staff and faculty members.

On the first day of their visit, the delegation toured Faith Kindergarten and King's Vision Middle School, affiliated with The United African University of Tanzania (UAUT), where they encouraged the students and teachers. They then proceeded to The United African Technical College (UATC), the university's technical and vocational training institution, to gain firsthand insight into the higher education programs offered campus. Additionally, denominational leaders held a special meeting with missionaries representing various denominations, sharing updates on the current state of missions and offering mutual encouragement.


In addressing the proper attitude toward Scripture, Rev. Kim urged, "We must approach the Bible with reverence and respect, reading it with a heart willing to obey. It is essential to read prayerfully, attentively, and regularly. Moreover, we should make it a lifelong habit to continuously read and listen to God's Word." He also advised, "When listening to sermons, we must receive them not as the words of men but as the Word of God. The more we listen with a longing heart and in prayer, the greater the grace we receive.

Rev. Kim passionately encouraged students and faculty to put Scripture into practice, leading them in a collective call to action: "Let us read the Bible! Let us listen to sermons attentively! Let us study the Scriptures! Let us memorize God's Word! Let us meditate on the Word! Let us teach the Bible! Let us proclaim the Word!

Concluding his message, Rev. Kim exhorted, "The house of faith that we are building must not be according to our own desires but according to God's blueprint—His Word. We must live in accordance with the Bible at all times and in all places. May our faith be firmly established upon this truth.

During the recent visit of the General Assembly leadership to the university, Rev. Jong Hyuk Kim, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Korea (Hapdong), delivered a powerful message during the university's weekly Wednesday chapel service held at the JCC Hall. Preaching from Acts 17:10-15 on the theme "The Bible and the Life of Faith," he imparted deep spiritual insight, touching the hearts of faculty members and students alike.

Rev. Kim emphasized, "The core of all Scripture is Jesus Christ. The Bible is divinely inspired by the Holy Spirit and is therefore inerrant." He further declared, "The truth of salvation is found solely in Scripture, which serves as the only standard for our life of faith." Encouraging students to engage with the Word, he stated, "The Bible contains answers to all fundamental questions of life, so we must draw near to it and read it diligently.

ELDER KWANGSEOK CHOI DONATES A PING PONG TABLE, GREAT ENCOURAGEMENT TO STUDENTS





This facility will significantly enhance the university's mission in educational and media evangelism mission, strengthening its outreach efforts.

A pressing prayer request remains securing the additional construction funds needed due to higher-than-anticipated costs, as well as acquiring the necessary lighting and sound equipment in a timely manner. We earnestly seek the prayers and support of those with a heart for missions in Tanzania and across Africa.







UAUT LAUNCHES "MANNA PROJECT" TO PROVIDE FREE BREAKFAST FOR STUDENTS AND WORKERS



The United African University of Tanzania (UAUT) has launched the "Manna Project", an initiative providing free breakfast to students and workers facing financial hardship. Since its inception, the project has expanded to serve nearly 80 people daily, including dormitory students, security guards, Maasai night guards, and construction workers.

UAUT Vice Chancellor, who took office in February last year, has been leading multiple efforts, including university promotion, student recruitment, staff management, policy restructuring, and preparations for meeting the requirements of the Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU). Amid these responsibilities, providing free breakfast for dormitory students emerged as a key priority, as many struggled with financial difficulties, often skipping meals. To tackle this issue, the university hired a chef, Samuel, and secured essential ingredients such as flour, cooking oil, and sugar. The meals provided include Mandazi, a popular East African sweet, doughnut-like bread, and Chapati, a flatbread made by rolling and pan-cooking dough. Initially, the project supported 50 students, but its impact quickly grew, now benefiting around 80 individuals daily, including security personnel and laborers working on campus.



UAUT expresses deep gratitude to all supporters who have made this initiative possible. As the project grows, the university is exploring ways to ensure its sustainability, including potential partnerships with local communities. The Manna Project reflects UAUT's commitment to serving students and workers not only through education but also by meeting their basic needs. STRENGTHENING THE FACULTY: NEW PROFESSORS JOIN UAUT FOR EDUCATIONAL MISSION



The United African University of Tanzania (UAUT) is pleased to welcome two esteemed teaching faculty who have recently joined the faculty to fulfill the mission of educational ministry. Dr. Ho-Wan Song, a mathematician and missionary, and Prof. Jin-Ki Hwang, a New Testament scholar, have committed themselves to the development of Christian education and the training of pastors in Tanzania.

Dr. Ho-Wan Song: A Bridge Between Mathematics and Theology

Dr. Ho-Wan Song earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in mathematics from Kyungpook National University, Korea, and went on to complete his Ph.D. in mathematics at the same institution. He later built his academic career by teaching mathematics at KAIST, Kyungpook National University, and Kyungnam University. In addition to his expertise in mathematics, Dr. Song pursued theological training, obtaining a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Korea Theological Seminary and a Master of Theology (Th.M.) in missiology. He was sent as a missionary by the Kosin Church General Assembly Mission Board (KPM) and devoted several years to theological education and missionary work in the Philippines and India.



Since August last year, Dr. Song has been serving at UAUT as the Chaplain of the University Church, while also teaching mathematics. His mission is to integrate faith and scholarship, nurturing the next generation of Christian leaders. His wife, Mrs. Jiwon Shin holds a Korean language teaching certificate and serves at both UAUT and UATC, providing Korean language education as part of her missionary work.

STRENGTHENING THE FACULTY: NEW PROFESSORS JOIN UAUT FOR EDUCATIONAL MISSION



Prof. Jin Ki Hwang: A Scholar of the New Testament

Prof. Jin-Gi Hwang pursued his undergraduate studies in philosophy at Seoul National University, Korea, before earning a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Chongshin University. He then specialized in biblical theology at Golden Cornel Seminary in the United States and obtained a Ph.D. in New Testament Studies from Fuller Theological Seminary.

Dr. Hwang has dedicated his career to integrating faith and academics, serving as an assistant professor at Fuller Theological Seminary and as a faculty member at Georgia Central University and Evangelia University. Now, he has embraced the calling of educational missions at UAUT in Tanzania, where he is committed to training local theology students and church leaders. His wife, Mrs. Young-Sil Hwang, also shares a missionary vision. She is devoted to evangelism by teaching English, Bible studies, and the Korean language to the Maasai people responsible for security at UAUT.

Dr. Ho-Wan Song and Prof. Jin-Gi Hwang will take on a significant role in equipping church leaders in Tanzania and across the African continent. They will oversee the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) program and the establishment and operation of a theological seminary at UATC. Through their efforts, UAUT and UATC are expected to offer a more structured theological education, with a particular emphasis on training pastors and enhancing missionary work through media. The dedicated ministry of these two scholars in Tanzania marks a new chapter for the university, reinforcing its vision for pastoral training and media-driven ministry.
